MORE than 80 South African corporate executives set off from Victoria Falls this week to take part in the inaugural Computershare Change a Life Cycle, a 450km event that has raised R4m in funds to help combat crime

The event entails three days of cycling along the Zambezi River and encompasses parts of Zimbabwe, Botswana, Namibia's Caprivi Strip and Zambia.

Each of the 81 participants has raised R20 000 in sponsorship with Computershare matching all funds raised rand for rand, in aid of the Mike Thomson
